Need for coordination in MSP

Unpacking the discourse: four narratives

1. Instrumental argument
2. Historical-institutionalist perspective
3. Relational perspective
4. Critical argument



1. Instrumental argument

- ◊ MSP as a rational planning process
- ◊ An efficient and effective process is more legitimate
 - ◆ Avoiding unnecessary actions
 - ◆ Achieving commonly set goals (ecological, economic and social objectives)
- ◊ Involvement of stakeholders helps the planning process

Coordination to strengthen efficiency and effectiveness

(cf. Douvere and Ehler, 2009;
Douvere and Pomeroy, 2008)



2. Historical institutionalism

- ◊ Institutions are designed to be robust and resilient, thus not easily changed
- ❖ Freedom of the Seas principle (Mare Librum)
- ❖ State authority and private property defined differently than on land (UNCLOS)

- ◊ A “patchwork” of institutions (and much ambiguity)

Coordination helps to address institutional ambiguities and contributes to defining strategies for synergies

(cf. Guirreiro et al, 2010; Van Leeuwen et al, 2012; Van Tatenhove, 2013, 2016)



3. Relational approach

- ◆ Notion of marine space is not “fixed” but described by relations between human actors, activities and (living and non-living) objects
- ◆ MSP as a process of spatial ordering (and re-ordering) activities
- ◆ Focus on the (re-) definition of socio-political space: power dynamics and contestation

Coordination enables MSP in creating an arena that nourishes ‘multiple ways of knowing’



4. Critical argument

- ◊ Globalization brings in a new normative order
- ◊ “Radical MSP”: attention for social justice
 - ◆ unequal access of actors to planning processes
 - ◆ deliberate exclusion
 - ◆ non-participation
 - ◆ cultural differences are not considered

Coordination to strengthen democratic legitimacy –
ensuring equality and inclusivity of participatory MSP
