

Scientific Workshop: Comparing MSP in EU and South Atlantic

WP3 – D. 3.1

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Short workshop description

The workshop links up to the work in the work package 3 (WP3), entitled “Governance and policy dynamics in tropical MSP”. Researchers involved in this WP employ a legal and socio-political perspective, to better understand (emerging) policy practices, processes and institutional contexts enabling and/or constraining MSP governance dynamics in the transboundary, North-South Atlantic.

From the perspective of the PADDLE researchers, the workshop had three main aims:

- Informing workshop participants about the insights gained through the review work of institutional arrangements, legal frameworks, coastal and marine policies at the national, regional and international level, with particular focus on Tropical Atlantic (task 3.1);
- Gathering information (examples, experiences) from relevant stakeholders for the mapping of relevant policies for (future) MSP in Brazil (task 3.2);
- Mobilizing knowledge, exchanging viewpoints and discussing different perspectives to derive at insights or guidelines important for the development, designation and implementation of MSP in the Tropical Atlantic (task 3.3/3.4).

For the participants, the workshop provided:

- Enhanced understanding of MSP as (new) policy paradigm;
- Enhanced knowledge about current practices and policies relevant for Brazil, Senegal and Cabo Verde (on the national, regional and international level);
- Room to contribute to constructive critical thinking about future development, designation and implementation of MSP in Brazil.

The general introduction provided the conceptual framework for the workshop, which examined the different perspectives in terms of governance at sea. From fishing areas to surfing reserves, marine protected areas and legislation governing oil exploitation, a series of presentations



provided an overview of the existing areas in Brazil... First steps towards MSP in Brazil were presented the next day. But beforehand, a detour to Europe was allowed by the European partners of the project, who presented the MSP in Portugal, France and the North Sea, within the framework of the European Union's integrated maritime policy. This workshop was closed by the presentation of existing interconnections across the tropical Atlantic, between Cape Verde, Senegal and Brazil.

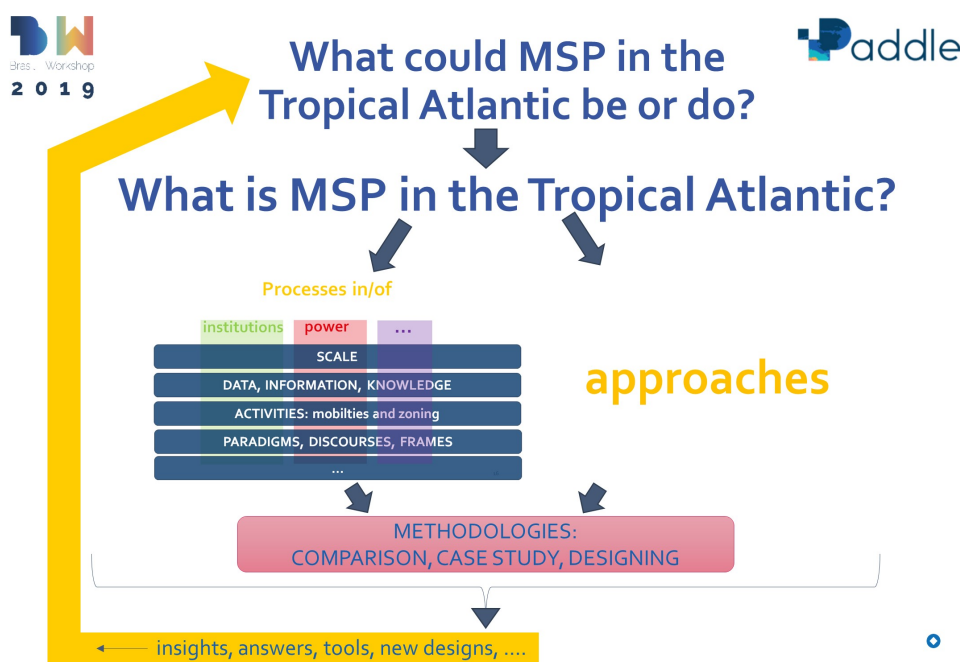

The PADDLE Brazil Workshop on “MSP in the Tropical Atlantic: Governance Dynamics” included a two-day writing session. The writing session was organized by, and for, PADDLE partners participating in WP3, and for other researchers, either involved in other WPs, or from Brazilian universities. The session was hosted by CEPENE. The aim of the writing session was to deepen common engagement and deliberation about the social sciences contribution to a better understanding of MSP in the Tropical Atlantic. The envisioned (tangible) outcome was to come to a list of paper ideas which can lead to publications in the near future.

The session was designed to co-create an inspiring working environment based on trust and mutual respect of diversity, both culturally as disciplinary. In small groups, participants mapped out the key points they derived from the presentations and discussions in the International Workshop held in Recife. Combined and integrated, the plenary group came to main questions for addressing marine and coastal governance on spatial use, conflicts and synergies in the Tropical Atlantic. They ranged from explorative social sciences questions (governance by/for whom, at what level, how, why) to theory-induced questions on institutionalization, discourses, legitimacy, effectiveness and transparency, as well as methodological issues. There also was a fruitful debate on the “Tropicalization” of new concepts, like MSP, as this demands for a different take on issues of scale, marine (socio-ecological) systems, diversity, and informational processes.

Feedback from the participants was very positive, since new collaborations arose and existing cooperation was strengthened. The group came up with five paper ideas - each proposed by partners from at least three different institutions. As such, the writing session was held in true spirit of PADDLE’s mission to establish and foster knowledge exchange and research collaborations.

A highlight

The workshop brought together 65 participants (30 European and 35 Brazilian). Local partners' interest of this workshop was highlighted by the participation of many administrations (Federal Ministry of the Environment, Ministry of the Environment of Pernambuco, Interministerial Commission for Marine Resources); and several Brazilian universities (Univ Brasilia, UPM-Sao Paulo, UFPE, UFRPE, Univ. Cearra).

Despite being a WP3 deliverable, this workshop united researchers from all project workpackages, demonstrating a strong interest in the consortium for interdisciplinary exchanges.
